GARDENING TIP By Jennifer Sawyer Caraballo

It's easy to overwinter certain vegetables in the garden.
Certain cool season crops, such as kale, overwinter well with just
a bit of extra shelter. You can make a small hoop house to cover a
raised bed or create a cold frame with old windows and a few straw bales.



There are also inexpensive row cover systems. Just make sure that whatever material you use, you can lift it up to harvest, water and ventilate when it gets really hot – you'll be surprised how warm it can get under cover on a cold winter day.
